Great Progress at Domain

Saturday 20th August dawned overcast and showery but turned in to a 20-degree spring day when 40 passionate planters and helpers gathered at the Domain for a working bee that ran like clockwork.



Helpers included 5 pre and primary aged children whose parents and grandparents demonstrated what it means to be part of a community project, and to volunteer by donating time and effort without expecting financial gain. It was heartening to witness such inspirational

role models and the engagement and enthusiasm of the young ones.

Leading up to the working bee David Sapsford mowed the pathway edges and Brent & Liz Besley conned their Aussi sister and brother-in-law, over here on holiday, to wheelbarrow loads of lime to create ramps on & off the board walks! Sal also sawed and piled up the dead tree debris ready for carting away. MDC's James Adamson organised for the trees to be collected from Leafland and delivered on the Friday morning when labels were attached and trees ferried in to position.

The day began at 8.30 (though there was a particular 8.00am 'early bird'!). Everyone was briefed with a map of where their sponsored tree or trees were positioned if they had one and if not, they ferried their wheelbarrows, spades & shovels to the new pathway & planting area & simply got stuck in. Rob Partington came with his latest birthday present from wife Fay.....a



hand-held auger. This machine, made quick work of digging holes to 40cm though it was clear that a fair amount of strength and skill was involved, especially in the rocky 'picnic spot' up the hill. A truck load of mulch arrived when planting was underway which is when the two quad trailors came in to their own carting it to various points for distribution.



Rabbits are a pest in the village and Christ and Christine Pullar addressed this by donating 100 protective surrounds for all the trees. They demonstrated how to put them in place- some of the low branched plants with wider girths requiring two joined together.

As has been mentioned in previous newsletters Leafland supplied the highquality trees some of which were in 90L containers and up to 3m tall. They sponsored 50% of the cost and the other 50% was sponsored by residents of the Pohangina Valley and its wider community. However, we had a surprise donor of 32 Kowhai seedlings propagated from seed and nurtured by Damien Campbell & his family who live in Ashhurst.

Most of these were planted in a glade that will not be on the walkway but will provide food for birds and a beautiful backdrop for both the neighbours



and Domain users. We have also received a generous \$300 donation from local valley resident Donna Craft towards future planting and a number of commitments have been received from future sponsors for the next stage of pathway planting.

By smoko most of the planting and mulching was done and some attendees



had moved on to further weekend commitments but for those remaining the pavilion and picnic tables were put to good use. Thanks again Ashhurst Pohangina Lions. The final job was staking and securing trees with webbing and scattering a slow-release fertilisereveryone had departed by 1.30pm. Thanks everyone for a brilliant day's team work and making new and rekindling old friendships.



An exciting idea was conceived at the working bee- Fay & Rob Partington have offered for ADP Design to sponsor a macrocarpa seat to be located in the picnic area. It will be concreted in giving stability and security. A special feature will be a bronze plaque of a haiku. The community are invited to take part in creating the haiku. Looking ahead to future maintenance, we are very lucky to have David Sapsford offer to mow both the newly planted area and the hill area. He has begun this and it is coming up well.

The small kowhai seedlings will need regular releasing using roundup or manual weeding to prevent from grass encroachment while they are young. Damien and his children have begun this.

There is sufficient mulch remaining to reapply to the trees planted in the oval at the first working bee 2 years ago. The ones in the picket surrounds will need some pickets unscrewed to access for weeding and mulching. Those without surrounds on the lower level by Domain Road can be weeded then mulched as is.

Watering the new trees may be necessary depending on the season and will take a bit of thought and coordination to achieve especially if it is a dry summer. James Adamson suggested MDC could lend a water tank which could be put on a trailor. ORCHARDS FROM POHANGINA PAST

Many of us know how well citrus trees grow in the Valley, but did you know that by the late 1890s the Pohangina Valley was well known for its orchards?



On 21 December 1898, the New Zealand Graphic published a pictorial map of New Zealand as a supplement to its Christmas issue. Pohangina featured clearly with a population of 1,851, a total land area of 188,800 acres, 100,000 acres of forest, and fruit noted as a main land use. Looking back through the National Library's Papers Past digital newspaper collection, most properties for sale in Pohangina in the 1890s to 1920s mentioned a 'good orchard'.

Mr J.M. Durling's farm on Valley Road near the Raumai Post Office was hailed as one of the best in the

country with six acres of every known variety of fruit tree specially selected to meet the peculiarities of the climate. Despite taking the precautionary measure of erecting props, his crop of apples was so abundant in January 1890 the branches were breaking with the weight of the fruit.

A forty-five-acre dairy farm that included a oneand-a-half-acre orchard containing 140 trees was up for sale in 1896 for £800. Fronting onto the main road, the property, which boasted a good nine-roomed house with every modern convenience, was ideally situated one mile from the cheese factory, two miles from the creamery, and two and a half miles from the Ashhurst township and railway. By 1901, about ten acres of Fredrick Richards' 628acre farm on the rich river-bed flats and level terraces at the junction of Coal Creek and the Pohangina River, six miles from the Pohangina township, were laid out as orchard.

In the spring of 1903, the cherry trees in Mr Reteymeyer's fourteen-acre orchard on the western side of the river at Awahou South were heavily laden with fruit. Reteymeyer had a reputation as a successful orchardist, notably with his experiments for dealing with pests. But not all orchard pests were of the insect variety. A highly respected unnamed Valley resident was reported to have been so annoyed that his orchard was being robbed, he set up a careful watch to discover the identity of the marauder, only to find it was his favourite old milking cow. Another anonymous settler known for the quality of his apples, had a grievance against certain local lads. He did not mind them sneaking his apples

but objected to his trees being ruined in the process.

In February 1913, the well-known property in Komako belonging to Hugh Fraser came up for lease. Considered one of the best grazing farms in the Valley at the time, Fraser's 1323-acres was an attractive proposition with all the necessary outbuildings and farm accessories including a woolshed, concrete dipping yards, stables, cowshed and two cottages at the lower end of the property. As well as an eleven-room homestead fitted with acetylene lighting, hot and cold water, and telephone, Fraser's property boasted an eleven-and-a-half-acre apple tree orchard.

A strange fruit resembling a large pear was reported in February 1933 to be growing in an old orchard in the

> Pohangina district. Enquiries from the Department of Agriculture's fruit inspector revealed the fruit was a Bottan's plum, originating from Californian fruit experimenter Luther Burbank, whose products were so unusual he was accused of faking nature. Shunned by dealers, shippers, canners, and dryers alike when first introduced in the early 1890s, within a couple of decades the "Burbank plum" was grown more widely than any other variety of plum. Described as a large round dark red fruit with sweet juicy aromatic yellow flesh, the "Burbank plum" is still readily available in nurseries around New Zealand. There may even be one in your back yard!

COUNTY FAYRE - August 2022 "County Fayre is the creative, social and historical heart of the Pohangina Valley"

"The Pohangina Downhill Walk" is a fund-raising event run by County Fayre that takes you on a spectacular journey through 6kms of farmland and native bush on the old Branch Road. History says the Branch Road follows the ancient Māori route, the Ahimaramara Track, which ran from Hawkes Bay into the Rangitikei Valley. Before the settlers came to the valley, wild cattle roamed the hills, farmers often hunted these cattle on horseback, and sold the meat and skins in Ashhurst. Later those living on the edge of the bush captured the



wild cattle and sold them in the yards in Pohangina. The settlers formed the Branch Road on the old track, which linked Kiwitea via Coulters Line with the Pohangina township. In the 1920's the Finnis Bridle Track (now Finnis Road) was widened to provide an alternative main route, replacing the Branch Road, which was eventually closed to vehicles in the 1960's following a series of large slips, leaving us today with the Branch Road Walkway.

Here is your opportunity to walk the track of the pioneers and take in spectacular scenery of the surrounding region and beautiful native bush, tickets cost \$30 Adults, \$15 Children (5-15yrs) and \$100 a Family, under 5's are free. Included in your ticket is a shuttle bus ride to the top of the track, where your walk will commence, and a nutritious lunch, that will be waiting for you once you arrive back at County Fayre. Chilean Rhubarb, also known as gunnera, is a large ornamental garden plant that, unfortunately, doesn't stay in the garden. It has large rhubarb-shaped leaves which can be as big as a cars bonnet, tall flower spikes which can have thousands of seeds, and large, fleshy root-like structures called root structures rhizomes. It loves damp, boggy areas in gardens such as on the edges of ornamental ponds, unfortunately, it can spread rapidly from these areas. Birds love the bright orange seeds and can transport them in any direction. When seeds are deposited on a suitable surface the plant will flourish. Infestations occur

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on river and stream banks, papa cliffs, bogs and wetlands, and often in roadside drains. Gunnera can drastically alter the species composition of these areas, crowding out native species, collecting sediment and blocking small waterways or drains. It also has been seen invading pasture in wet paddocks, outcompeting desirable plants and reducing grazing.

The Pohangina Valley has a few sites of this plant, mostly around Raumai, but it has escaped from a number of gardens in the valley over the past few decades. Horizons staff have found and controlled

a lot of these sites, but there still may be some sites out there that we don't know of yet. As Gunnera is classified as an eradication plant under Horizons' pest management plan, staff directly undertake the control in both gardens and wilding sites. The leaves die off over winter, but regrowth is well underway for this season. Horizons staff are urging anyone who has seen this plant either wilding or in a garden to get in contact with them so that they can control the plant. Contact Horizons on freephone 0508 800 800.

Readers and Writers Mini-Fest

The inaugural County Fayre Readers and Writers Mini-Fest was held on the 25th of September. All parts of the festival came together with ease. We had a great line-up of published writers from Pohangina Valley and the Ashhurst area. It was exciting to see people from Palmerston North, Fielding and the Valley seated snuggly in the Art Gallery space. Everyone present was well looked after by the County Fayre volunteers who served Devonshire teas throughout the festival.

Together the writers presented an impressive range of ideas and stories as well as giving the audience some insight into their writing practice and publishing journeys. Catherine Knight opened the afternoon with a compelling overview of

the connection between experiencing nature and wellbeing. Lynn Kirkland took us inside her memoirs; "My Italian Destiny" and "My Italian Legacy" with beautiful and historic photos. She revealed that it all started with a tragic war time story that set her family on a path that links her to Italy forever. Fiona McMorran gave us a well-crafted overview of her involvement with the Pohangina Valley Wine Estate and how her desire to document the experience led to her publishing the story. During the programme break Thom Conroy facilitated a short workshop in the library. The group were led through a writing exercise and within a few short magical minutes they had piece of writing right there on the page. Others

had time to read Jenny Coleman's poster series displayed in the hallway called "The Case of the Woman Bridegroom" based on Jenny's book Mad or Bad? The life and exploits of Amy Bock. In the second half of the programme, Jane Evans spoke with infectious enthusiasm about her children's natural learning outside the normal boundaries of schools. Thom Conroy brought the festival to a close by drawing together lots of the ideas discussed throughout the afternoon and delighting us with readings from two of his books. Some of us went home with newly purchased and signed books to read. Hopefully everyone went home happy.



Many years ago, in the days when horses were the main form of transport and cows were milked by hand, the original Pohangina Hall was built. Not very well, apparently, as it had to be rebuilt 36 years later. It was home to dances and celebrations, meetings and clubs. Halls like this sprang up all around the country, enriching the lives of the people in the local community.

As people move back to thinking "local", these halls are again becoming a feature. The Pohangina Hall has been reasonably quiet since the advent of Covid, but it has still been used for weddings, birthday parties and meetings. The quiz night last year was sold out and music sessions have recently started. However, to ensure the continued survival of this hall it needs to be used. If you are planning a celebration or a community event, consider the Pohangina Hall. It can hold up to 150 people, although the warm, woody interior makes it suitable for smaller groups too.
