Tēnā koutou katoa from RECAP

It's been another period of uncertainty for us all as we navigate the alert levels again. For those who have registered for workshops that have been postponed, we very much appreciate your patience and we're doing our best to keep our community services ticking along. We hope you are all keeping as well as can be with the ever moving landscape.

We've been working with Just Zilch to bring rescued kai out for Ashhurst and Pohangina residents. This is distributed from the back room at the Ashhurst Community Library every Tuesday from 3:30pm-5pm. While at level 2 we ask that you are masked, signed in, and observe a one in out rule. This is free to anyone who may need it for whatever reason. Bring your own bags and help yourself, but please make sure you leave some for others. Pass this on to any whanau, friends or neighbors who could use it and if anyone is unable to pick up, a food parcel can be delivered to them. Please contact Chris on 021755314 to request one. Any excess food will be taken to the wonderful folks at the Ashhurst Foodbank, and we'd like to give a big nga mihi to Marianne and Doug who put in a lot of mahi to help people via the foodbank over levels 4 & 3. It was a pleasure working with you!

Our next Crop Swap will be back in the Community Garden (next to the Ashhurst Library) on Saturday October 16th from 11am-1pm. Bring your excess produce, seeds, seedlings, preserves, baking, anything else gardening related, or just yourself! This is more of a sharing event than a swap, where you do not need to give in order to take (and vice versa) and



everything is free. There's usually a lot of good gardening korero happening at these, so feel free to just come for a chat.

We have a beginners/berm gardening



workshop available on Saturday October 23rd, 10am-1pm, facilitated by the wonderful Beth Lew of 'Growing Gardens and Communities - Manawatu' & Suzanne Chelius from RECAP/PNCC Sustainable Living Programme. This is one for those just starting out, with some info on best practice on berm gardening (now allowed without permission from the PNCC). This will be a

hands-on workshop where you will help create raised beds, with some easy growing seeds and seedlings to take home to start your own mara kai (food garden). If you've wanted to grow your own but don't know how to get started, this one's for you! We'll be covering: general site analysis and the importance of tracking sun/wind/water, using your berm to garden, the benefits of a no-dig garden bed/raised bed, soil health, building soil, seasonal planting/companion planting and more. Registrations will open soon, but if interested please contact chris@recap.org.nz.

Our seed library (within the Ashhurst Community Library) continues to hum along. We have been updating the Spring/ Summer crops and have a selection of tomato seeds via Heritage Food Crops Research Trust in Whanganui. Once you sign up (which you can do at the library) you are free to take 3 free packets per month. If you save seeds yourself, and are able to donate them to be distributed to others please contact: info@recap.org.nz. Community participation with the sharing of seeds promotes the development of seeds acclimated to our specific area, which is building a valuable long term resource for us all.

Pest Traps are still available for Ashhurst and Pohangina. These are specialty traps which are free for residents. If you would like a trap, please contact Ian Rasmussen at irassy64@gmail.com to find out more.


Low attendance may force Dance-fit cancellation

Having said that over the last twelve months there has been a couple of topics that have split the Council and this has resulted in some tense discussions and decision some are still not happy with.

I have approached the roading team in regard to the Branch Walkway still being a paper road and is there a responsibility for Council to still have some input, especially when the locals are using the outstanding feature for public access and fundraising opportunities. I will keep you posted.

The new toilet at County Fayre looks great and I'm looking forward to seeing the ramp completed into the Library.


will be offered if the walk is cancelled due to COVID restrictions. Thank you to those who volunteered to undertake the

Three Waters Media release

Manawatū District Council is not convinced by the government's proposed Three Waters Reform Programme, following overwhelming opposition from community feedback.

In a written submission to the Minister of Local Government Nanaia Mahuta, Manawatū District Mayor, Helen Worboys, outlined the reasons for the Council's position.

"This Three Waters Reform Programme, which is government's preferred model of service delivery, is not in the best interests of the Manawatū Community. This is based on feedback that we have received from our community, our own calculations, and the view of Council" says Worboys.

The community feedback received by 5:00pm on Wednesday 29 September saw 94 percent of respondents opposed the government's proposal out of a total of 2540 responses.

Council's three waters assets have an estimated current market value (optimised replacement cost) of \$329M and these have been paid for by the community. The Department of Internal Affairs dashboard classifies MDC's operating performance for three waters as "exceeding expectations". Our three waters infrastructure and service delivery is not broken and does not need fixing, is the view of Council and our community. Ongoing renewals, maintenance and upgrades are budgeted in our 10 Year Plan and 30 Year Asset Management Plans.

"The community of the Manawatū have told us that they want our three water services to be owned, managed, built and operated locally, by people who understand our district," says Worboys. "We need to be able to be nimble, and make three waters planning decisions in conjunction with roading planning, district planning and with function it will take, and to provide this to a local economic development lens."

While the removal of associated three waters debt is highlighted as a benefit of the proposal, Worboys says that "any additional borrowing and interest expense would still need to be recovered from ratepayers", which potentially means ratepayers are worse off once their water entity bill is factored in.

The rural community also highlighted issues around the ownership and management of rural water schemes and raised doubts that committees that manage these schemes would see their current cash reserves reinvested into their assets.

Council suggested that while Iwi/Māori have an increased presence under the proposed governance model, Council believes that local Iwi/Māori may lose their voice and influence over three waters decision making in the same way as council would under this proposal. The community had considerable criticism of the cumbersome governance system, and the lack of democratic accountability.

Mayor Worboys has said that the council's preferred position is to retain the status quo. However, they are prepared to re-look at and further investigate a regional service delivery model for three waters infrastructure.

"Preliminary groundwork on a regional model has been undertaken and was progressing. This was put on hold awaiting government direction from the Three Waters Reforms. MDC intends to explore a collaborative regional service delivery model in more detail, including what form and government during the formal consultation phase for this Three Waters Review," says Worboys. "There are other better ways to address the deficit of investment in three waters infrastructure in some parts of the country."

Council has also highlighted the need for strategic alignment of Three Waters reform, Resource Management Act reform and Local Government reform which has just commenced. "The Government has the cart before the horse. It is too late to review what the future of Local Government should be after it has taken about a third of what Councils do away from Councils," says Worboys.

While you are there you they will make an appointment for you in three weeks' time for your second vaccination. The staff are very friendly and helpful, and will answer any questions you may have.

Local Covid-19 vaccination rates lag

On 8th October, vaccination rates by suburb/local area were released.

In the area called Pohangina - Apiti, 729 people, which is 73.2% of the eligible population (those 12 years of age and older) had received at least one dose.

447 people, which is 44.9%, had received two doses.

Across the country on that same date, 80% of the eligible population had received at least one dose.

50% had received two doses.

Of course by the time you receive this newsletter more of us will probably be vaccinated, but this is the latest information just at the moment.

Thanks everyone for getting it done as soon as you can!

HISTORY SNIPPETS

Fire at Raumai: Hotel Completely Destroyed 100 Years Ago

"A brilliant glare in the sky in the direction of the Pohangina Valley last evening drew the attention of Palmerston North people to the fact that a serious outbreak of fire had occurred in that vicinity. Later, this was confirmed when the "Manawatu Times" correspondent at Raumai reported over the 'phone that, shortly before ten o'clock a disastrous fire had occurred at Raumai, when Gray's Hotel was completely destroyed. Mr and Mrs Gray left the hotel about 7.30 to go out for the evening, and no-one was on the premises when the outbreak commenced. The blaze was first discovered by Messrs T. Spelman

and Balmer, who, in company with Mr Len Foord, whose store adjoins the hotel, valiantly set to work to extinguish the flames. The three men were later joined by others but in spite of their united and energetic efforts they could save nothing. The whole building was razed to the ground. Sparks from the fire caught the grass on the hill-side at the back of the building, but the blaze was prevented from extending far in that direction. Fortunately the wind was blowing in a favourable direction, or the neighbouring premises might have suffered also. As far as could be discovered last evening, the outbreak started in the kitchen, but its origin is not known. The insurance on the property was not ascertainable."

Rabbits in the Pohangina 100 Years Ago

"Rabbits are becoming quite numerous in the Pohangina district. Several settlers informed a Manawatu Standard representative that they had never seen the pest so numerous in the district as at the present time. This is to be deplored when one recalls the destruction wrought in Central Otago pastures by bunny. There it is on record that the rabbits ran several big runholders off their land, including two ex-Cabinet Ministers. The result is that today many thousands of acres of pastoral land which formerly carried thousands of sheep have been given over almost entirely to 'brer rabbit'."



Pohangina Catchment Care Group update

The PCCG has been reasonably quiet the last few months since Land Owners Field Day on July 13th. Monthly water testing has continued at the 11 sites

throughout the valley except for August when Covid lockdown kept us at home. Water levels were reasonably high during the September testing which caused some interesting results.

Local farmers, residents and community groups continue to fund the cost of water testing which PCCG is very grateful for. It is recommended to continue

water testing for 3 years to gain a trend and then either continue to test quarterly or take a break for 3-5 years before starting

another 3-year cycle. The impact of any projects that have been implemented may then be measured.

The group has a Strategy and Operational Workshop planned for November 2nd facilitated by Richard Parkes. Funding for this has been provided by MPI through the Manawatu River
